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КОННОТАЦИЯ И ДЕНОТАЦИЯ В СТРУКТУРЕ ЯЗЫКОВОГО ЗНАКА

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Каким образом из коннотативных звуков рождаются денотативные слова; говоря обобщенно -каким образом из до-и внеязыкового употребления звуков рождается язык, чисто человеческий вид деятельности? Каким образом коннотация становится денотацией? Коннотативное слово всегда связано с той конкретной ситуацией, в которой оно возникает. Так, слово "аминь", будучи примером типичной коннотации, т. е., не являясь обозначением какого-либо конкретного предмета, обозначает конкретную ситуацию завершения молитвы, действия или ритуала. Оно ничего не «значит» вне этой ситуации и поэтому не употребляется вне нее. Денотативное же слово переводит это ситуативное значение из однократного личного опыта в «общий план», делает его пригодным для многих возможных ситуаций. Оно формирует «банк памяти» и саму память, превращая коннотативные звуки
